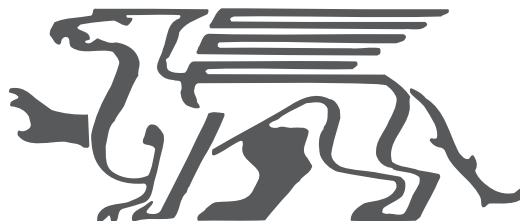

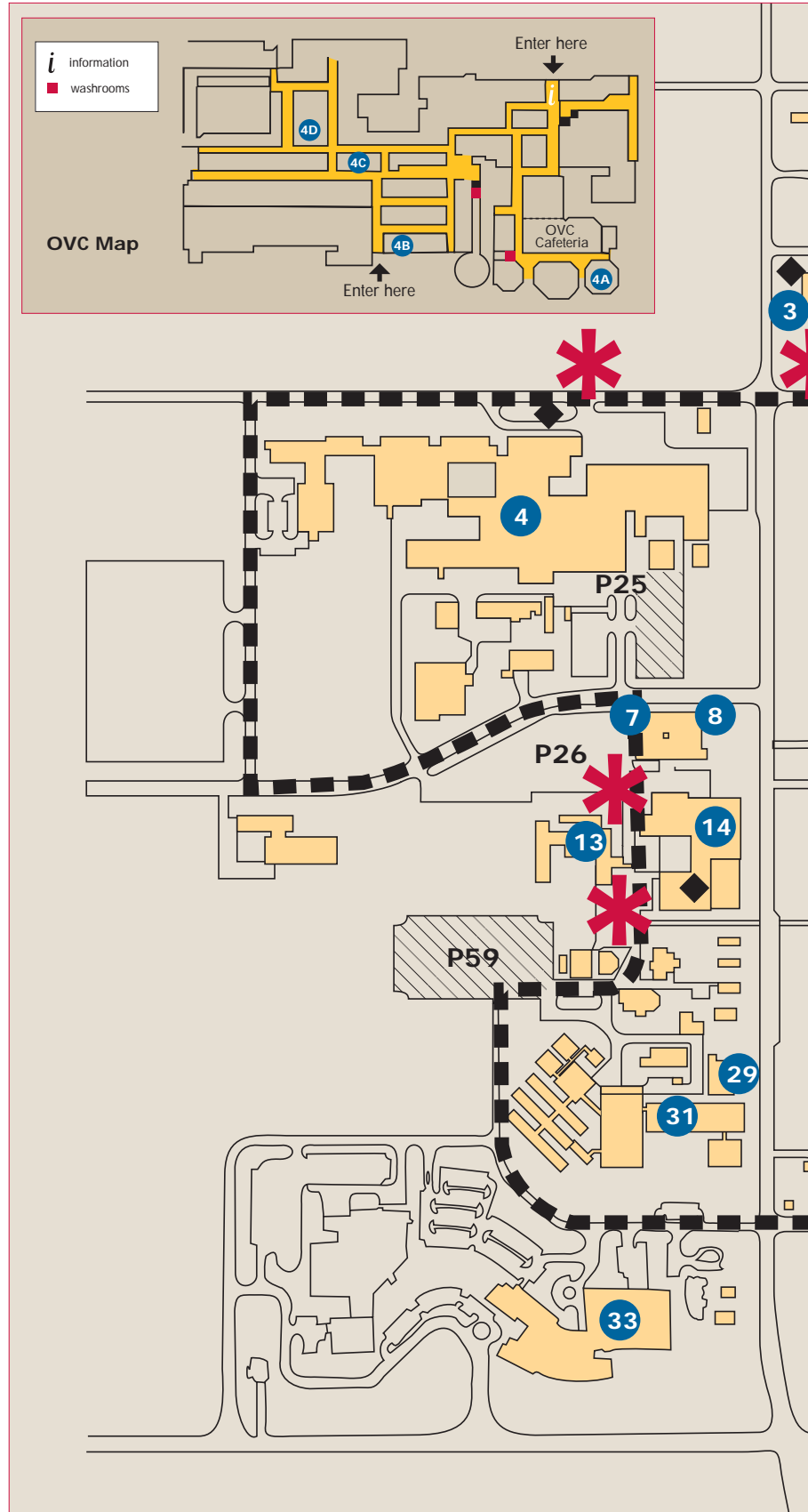

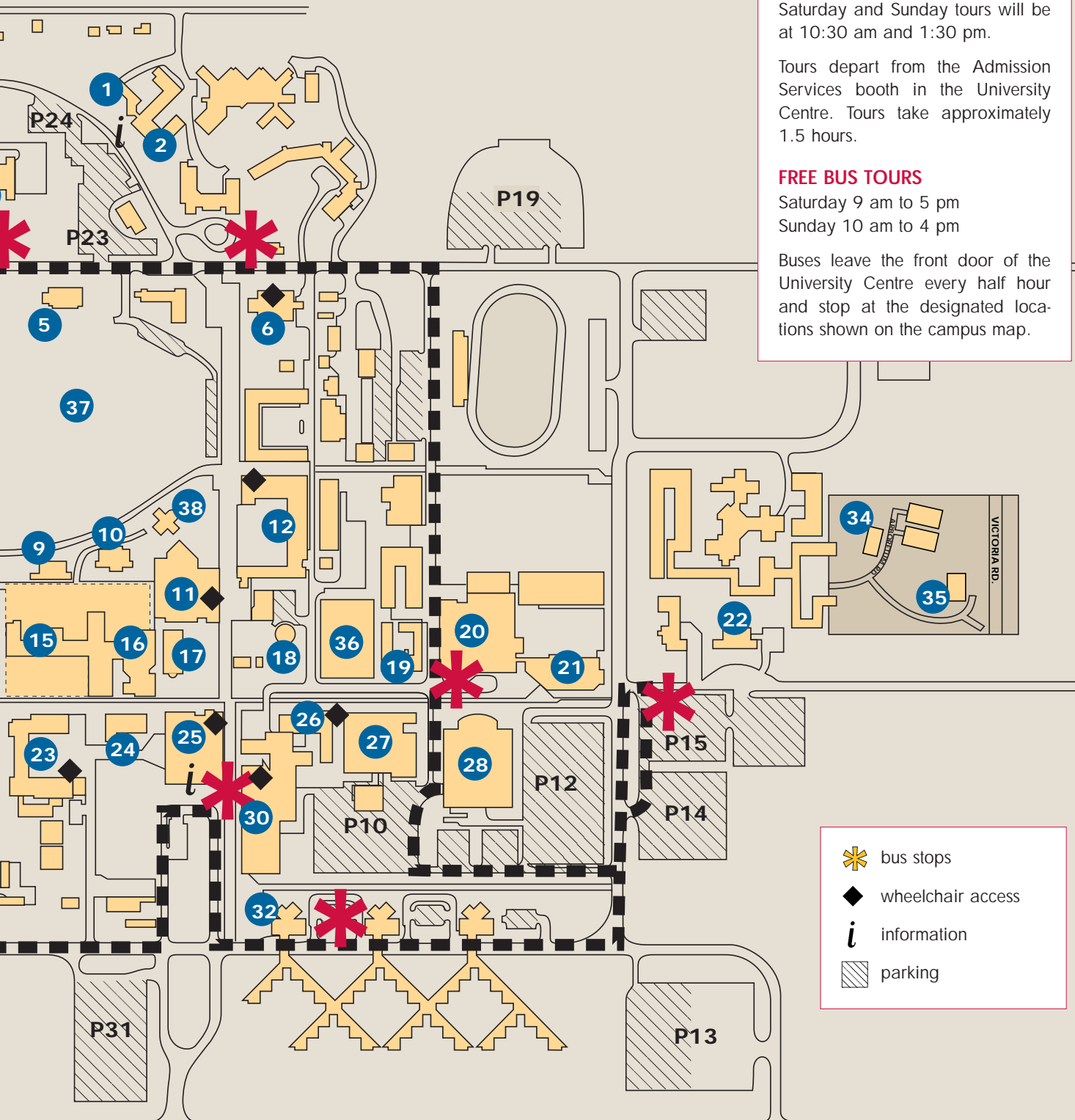

A ROYAL HISTORY

When visiting College Royal™ in 2004, it is hard to picture the event's "Royal Roots" that took hold 80 years ago.

The legend of College Royal™ began when this campus was home to only the Ontario Agricultural College (OAC), years before the University of Guelph was established in 1964. College Royal™ has grown from an idea that was proposed by Professor Toole, a 1920's faculty member in charge of the OAC judging teams. These teams competed annually against teams from the United States, at Chicago's International Fat Stock Show. In 1923 the OAC team was rewarded with a fourth place finish. The judging team returned to the competition in 1924 where they hoped for a victory, however they

came out disappointed as they received the 19th placing. After this competition Professor Toole suggested the team hold their own judging competition to showcase their talents. This judging competition is the "Royal Roots" of the event now known as College Royal™.

The first College Royal™ planning committee had only 10 members, which has grown into the 80 plus members today. The exhibits at the first College Royal™ represented the key clubs at the OAC, including the horticulture, poultry, agronomy and dairy clubs. The first livestock show was held in the Bullring, which is now known as a coffee shop. In 1929 College Royal™ became a full day event, and in 1935 it evolved into a two day affair. The year 1935 marked

the first time that women were allowed to compete in the livestock show and in 1965 the University of Guelph received

its charter, making it an official University, as College Royal™ celebrated its 40th year.
